Dear Staff Members, Network Providers and Community Partners,

I am happy to share our 2024/25 Annual Report of accomplishments and achievements, though its issuance this year is much later than usual. The delay has been the result of our need to manage

more time-sensitive projects and requirements this year. Like previous annual reports, the arts and charts contained in this report provide data and our active Service Network Listing from FY 2024.

Speaking of new requirements in this year, I wish to thank all of the clinical providers of children/youth and family services in both our board-operated and network services as well as Central Access and Intake and Utilization Management staff for their participation after decades of the use of the CAFAS and PECFAS Assessments on moving to the use of the new MichiCANS Screening and Assessment Tools, as required by MDHHS. These new tools are now in use not just by the 46 CMHSPs across the state like SCCMHA, but also by all of MDHHS local child welfare staff. The cooperation of staff involved across the network was so very much appreciated, as I know making the change to these clinical tools was a heavy lift.

I would also like to thank everyone involved in our successful recertification as a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) for 2025, a requirement of our status as one of the CCBHC sites and a part of the MDHHS CCBHC Demonstration to the federal government through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Service Administration (SAMHSA). The next CCBHC undertaking is the move to Direct MDHHS Payment and Reporting for FY 2026, which is no small administrative undertaking. This change will move reimbursement and the related reporting for the thousands of people enrolled in CCBHC in Saginaw County from the MidState Health Network (PIHP) to MDHHS.

Though workforce shortages have persisted in many areas at SCCMHA and at our contracted network agencies, we have seen significant improvements over last year. However, the continued rising demands for behavioral health services cannot be overstated. We have welcomed and trained new

staff in every department while maintaining our mission to serve persons served and their families in as timely a fashion as was possible.

We also took on and completed several capital improvements at our facilities this year, such as a complete remodel of the Hancock Building second floor Community Support Services suite. Our partners at Genoa Pharmacy engaged in their own remodel and reduction of their leased square footage space, which allowed us to create a new Outpatient Therapy Suite on the first floor.

Our IT department has made several hardware and software upgrades, added robust cyber security controls and cyber security staff training. We saw the voluminous amount of data stored in our warehouse converted into even more data dashboards created to meet the needs of staff providing direct service as well as to staff working in administrative functions by the Business Intelligence unit.

At the Albert & Woods Center, we replaced the old water tower/chiller, which was way past its usable life, with a new modern air-cooled system that can run all year round to assist building temperatures. In addition, there were smaller improvement projects at the A&W building to help divide training rooms and spaces for more flexibility of audience size. The Human Resources suite in the building was also renovated to create more space for the addition of new staff positions and efficiency.

In this year filled with triumphs and challenges, my deepest appreciation to our board, management team, staff members, contracted network providers and many other agency partners for their accomplishments to remain focused on our core mission of helping people gain service access, achieve their desired treatment goals and outcomes and promoting the value of mental health through community events and combating stigma.

MRSS and CrisisConnect Rolls Out

Saginaw County Community Mental Health Authority's Mobile Response & Stabilization Services (MRSS) launched a campaign in Saginaw County in April 2025, highlighting the availability of the service and its expansion to 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The campaign included two billboards, which were displayed on M-84 (Bay Rd.) and on I-675, near the Dow Event Center.

In addition, MRSS had a bus wrap ad on one of the STARS buses, and a radio ad which ran on Cumulus broadcast stations, WIOG and WHNN. MRSS is a team of mental health professionals trained to assist those in need through a mental health crisis, over the phone, virtually or in-person.

MRSS is an available service 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and can be reached at **(989) 272-0275**.

To further connect law enforcement to our crisis response teams, Saginaw County Community Mental Health Authority (SCCMHA) presented the CrisisConnect program during a series of countywide trainings with various law enforcement agencies.

The training sessions saw staff from SCCMHA talk to officers from all of the police departments in Saginaw County and other first responders, to better inform them of the services provided by SCCMHA that may help law enforcement in dealing with situations having to do with behavioral health conditions and to help them connect citizens to services as well.

CrisisConnect is a packaged kit of resources created to give officers tools to help Saginaw County citizens in a behavioral health crisis.

These kits consist of iPhones and iPads with preloaded contact information and apps to connect to MRSS, as well as SCCMHA's Crisis Intervention Services (CIS), a resource guide, and interpretive language services. The kits also have business cards with a dedicated law enforcement phone line, a tear-off notepad with information for other county resources that can be shared with residents, and other helpful tools for officers in the field.





Meet Our Newest Board Members














Recertified as CCBHC by MDHHS



The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) completed the process for the Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic-Demo (CCBHC-D) recertification process in late August 2024, recertifying Saginaw County Community Mental Health Authority (SCCMHA) as a CCBHC for Fiscal Year 2025.

Certification ensured that we met a specific list of national behavioral health standards established by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and adopted by MDHHS to be recognized as a CCBHC, for services to adults and children/youth with behavioral

health disorders. Certification allows for additional funding to assist with providing these services to those in need, including those with more mild and moderate conditions.

Changes that needed to be met by SCCMHA for recertification saw the implementation of a 24-hour available mobile crisis intervention service, provided by the Mobile Response and Stabilization Services (MRSS) unit as of March 2024. In addition, SCCMHA needed to meet the standards of an outpatient substance use disorder program. SCCMHA is working with Saginaw Psychological Services, a historic SCCMHA network provider to provide this service to CCBHC enrollees.

A total of 1,399 new persons were enrolled for service in CCBHC during FY2024 and 992 new persons have been enrolled this fiscal year through June 2025, with additional persons being added each week. As we include more of our network providers in our efforts, the enrollment will expand dramatically this next year. SCCMHA is one of 33 CCBHC sites in Michigan, included in the MDHHS CCBHC Demonstration to SAMHSA which will run through 2027.
